

Celebrate Summer! Visit Bordentown City's newest park, featuring a butterfly garden!




Introducing Lime Kiln Alley Park, Bordentown City's hidden gem, located along Blacks Creek, and accessed from Federal and Walnut Streets. This park was created by D&R Greenway Land Trust in partnership with the City of Bordentown. The park features a trail, picnic table, small parking area, and as of 2013, a beautiful garden designed with native plants to provide habitat and food for butterflies, birds and other animals.

Did you know?

- Blacks Creek is part of a large natural area, called the Abbott Marshlands, comprised of more than 3,000 acres of natural wildness in a densely populated landscape.
- The creek is a freshwater tidal waterway that drains into the Delaware River at Bordentown Beach.
- Native Americans lived here beginning 13,000 years ago. It was on this site that the nets used to catch shad in the Delaware River were laid out to dry.
- This permanently protected parkland was created by assembling more than a half dozen properties, beginning in 2004. There are plans to expand the butterfly garden this fall.

Visit the park often to walk the trail, enjoy seasonal changes, catch a glimpse of wildlife, cast a fishing line, and observe the changes in the tide. You will walk where Indians, early colonists, and likely Joseph Bonaparte, brother of Napoleon, once walked.
